→ To this day, the consequences of Nazi persecution were and are manifold: the loss of relatives, the search for a new home, physical or mental injuries, existential problems, social support and recognition, but also continued exclusion or discrimination have shaped the experiences and memory of those who were once persecuted, their relatives, and society as a whole. In this field, tracing bureaus, archives and others played an important role which so far has not been critically researched in detail.

Against this background, the ITS will host an international conference looking back on more than seven decades of tracing and documenting victims of Nazi persecution. The event marks the 70th anniversary of search bureaus from various European states meeting with the recently established International Tracing Service (ITS) in Arolsen, Germany, in the autumn of 1948. One aim is to discuss new findings on the history of the ITS in a broader context.
